

The Call Of Matthew (Mt 9:9-13)

⁹ As Jesus went on from there, he saw a man named Matthew sitting at the tax collector's booth. "Follow me," he told him, and Matthew got up and followed him.

¹⁰ While Jesus was having dinner at Matthew's house, many tax collectors and sinners came and ate with him and his disciples. ¹¹ When the Pharisees saw this, they asked his disciples, "Why does your teacher eat with tax collectors and sinners?"

¹² On hearing this, Jesus said, "It is not the healthy who need a doctor, but the sick. ¹³ But go and learn what this means: 'I desire mercy, not sacrifice.' ^v For I have not come to call the righteous, but sinners."

Mt 9:9-13

As a prisoner for the Lord, then, I urge you to live a life worthy of the calling you have received. ² Be completely humble and gentle; be patient, bearing with one another in love. ³ Make every effort to keep the unity of the Spirit through the bond of peace. ⁴ There is one body and one Spirit, just as you were called to one hope when you were called; ⁵ one Lord, one faith, one baptism; ⁶ one God and Father of all, who is over all and through all and in all.

Who was Matthew?

- Tax-collector A traitor vs Simon (zealot)
- Hated despised
- The textbook example of the "unrighteous"
- A sinner

How did Matthew respond to Jesus' call?

- He leaves the idolatry of his old lives and follows Jesus without hesitation
 - His financial security
 - His sense of control and self-reliance
 - **BUT**
- He doesn't sever the relationships of his former life
- He doesn't think he's too good to associate with them

- He remembers and shows hospitality to those people the religious establishment despises
- He invites Jesus into his world so he can transform it
- He lets Jesus grace and mercy define him and how he orients his life

What does Jesus mean with “I have not come to call the righteous, but sinners”?

- High / Low Anthropology

The example of Matthew

- Humility He knows he's not perfect
He knows Jesus loves him anyway
He doesn't frame his story to make himself the center of it
- Repentance He doesn't reject the label of sinner
He doesn't justify himself
He doesn't blame others
He doesn't negate the harm he caused
- Mission He shares his story
He doesn't keep the gospel to himself
He introduces Jesus to his friends
He eats with the wrong people
